

Is it a defining win? Do we have enough evidence yet to say that? How many of the young players that have been rightly praised to date this season really came of age in their senior career during that game?

The truth is we don't know yet.

After talking to Wayne Goodison at length following last Saturday's success, I know it's a theme that will be revisited in team talks – both today and probably for the next few weeks.

It won't surprise those who know me that I've followed Bootle closely following the appointment of Steve McNulty and Carl Macauley as their management team.

Curiously, the Bucks have lost all four fixtures played in the Northern Premier League since plundering maximum points at Macc.

Witton Albion were beaten in three of their next four games, drawing the other.

I'm not saying it's a curse, but it's perhaps to state the obvious that I'll be watching closely to see how 1874 respond to a landmark victory this afternoon.

Today's opponents, Glossop North End, will not make it easy.

The contrast to seven days ago is likely to be stark; the visitors to Townfield will not be bothered if the home team have more possession because they'll back themselves to defend with discipline.

I was hugely impressed with how the Hillmen performed at Wincham Park when I saw them in August. They won 1-0, but the margin between them and Albion was wider than that score suggests.

Stuart Mellish's men conceded just two goals in their first seven competitive matches this season, and the foundation on which they build is a solid one.

Glossop's form has been patchier of late mind; a single win, against Ramsbottom, in the past six West Division outings, of which they've lost four.

They did prevail in last term's corresponding game though when Finley Stanyer claimed the only goal. 1874 Northwich, in every way, are a different proposition this time around though.

To finish, a word or two about goalkeepers.

First, I want to add my encouragement and best wishes to Ellis Allen for a full and speedy return to health after a scary accident while on holiday on Portugal. It was uplifting to see he was part of the celebrations last weekend.

Second, I'll direct a nod of appreciation towards Tony Aghayere for how he has conducted himself in the past month or so.

Disappointed, naturally, to lose his place, he provided an exemplary response on the pitch at Macclesfield. It says plenty about him, not to mention the dressing room culture this team is nurturing.

FROM THE TERRACES

The words dreamland and raptures are often thrown about when describing levels of enjoyment at football matches, and a lot of the time it is hyperbole.

That wasn't the case on Saturday though when 1874 went to the league leaders and came back to Mid Cheshire with all three points. Both of the aforementioned terms were applicable in the first minute and at full-time in what will go down as one of the best away results in our ten-year history.

To go to Macclesfield who have the largest budget in the league and are essentially a professional outfit and come away with a victory is just fantastic for the club, and shows the progress that this side has made. The only downside from my point of view was that I was away at the weekend and couldn't head to the newly dubbed 'Sulkmen,' instead having to rely on the great Twitter updates for the latest happenings.

Needless to say, when it came through that the game had ended, one or two drinks were consumed in celebration and why not? Yes, it was only another game but to win in front of 3,500 fans was a special achievement by the lads and they deserve all the credit in the world.

In the cold light of day, the result meant that we had won four games on the bounce in the league, taking us up to the heady heights of 4th in the table. We'd actually be top now if we hadn't conceded those three late equalisers in those matches at the start of the season too.

Given some of the adjustment issues we had for parts of the last campaign our current form is impressive and I don't think many saw it coming back at the beginning of August. What these first few months have reinforced however is that we must always have faith in Bows and Goodie.

They have unearthed some exceptionally talented players who have vastly improved the squad and fitted in so well alongside those that stayed with us. The biggest area of improvement in my opinion has been at the back where we look more organised and defensively solid.



This is borne out by the goals against column which shows that we've only conceded nine times in 11 games so far which is joint-third best alongside Leek. Only Macc and Linnets have shipped fewer and it means that you're always in with a chance of taking something from a game if you're very miserly.

To put this into context, 18th placed Hanley have scored the same amount of goals as us but their opponents have breached their defence on 12 more occasions. Just having that solidity makes such a big difference to how you can approach games and hopefully we can continue in the same vein going forward.

You're only as good as your next match though and we need to back up the win at Macc with another good performance against Glossop today. At the time of writing The Hillmen haven't won in the league since the beginning of October although they did make a good start to the season.

It's always a competitive game against Glossop as we've seen on countless occasions down the years, so we'll have to work hard to get a positive result.

Let's get behind the lads once again.

BIG GAME PREVIEW

1874 NORTHWICH V GLOSSOP NORTH END NORTHERN PREMIER LEAGUE - WEST

Today 1874 Northwich welcome old friends and rivals from the NWCFL Glossop North End to Townfield for a NPL West fixture.

Having won 3 of their opening 6 league games, Glossop North End made a good start to the 2022/23 season occupying 2nd spot on the NPL table in the opening weeks of the season and were 3rd in the table on 17th September when they won 2-0 at Skelmersdale United.

However, their recent form has not been as good with them having the second worst run of form over their last six league games which has seen Glossop lose four times, draw once and win once – a 2-1 home win against Ramsbottom United on 1st October.

To break up the poor run of results, Glossop beat West Didsbury & Chorlton 2-1 in the Manchester Premier Cup on 18th October.

Last Saturday they drew 1-1 at home with Runcorn Linnets in front of a crowd of 446, Keaton Mulvey had given Glossop the lead in the 50th minute before Linnets equalized late on to earn a share of the points. Earlier this week Glossop lost 1-0 at Colne.

After Tuesday's game Glossop were 11th in the NPL West table seven places and five points below 1874:

Glossop's top goal scorer this season is Keaton Mulvey who has netted four times so far, closely followed by Luke Nock and Louis White who have both registered three goals.

Glossop North End's 9 home games this season have attracted an average crowd of 404 to Surrey Street, the best attendance being 1,015 for the visit of Macclesfield.

Prior to this season the two clubs had met five times, with both sides winning twice and the remaining game ending a draw.

WALKING HEROES

1874 NORTHWICH WOMEN'S WALKING FOOTBALL

Today we are delighted to welcome members of our Women's Walking Football group (players and coaches), several of whom are attending for the first time (but hopefully not the last).

Following on from the success of the men's group and encouraged by Cheshire FA, a women's section was started in 2021 and this has seen the group grow from 4 on that first day to over 25.

Ablly coached by members of the men's walking football group the women have quickly developed their skills.

In July, two 1874 Northwich teams took part in a mini-tournament organised by Cheshire FA, with 1874 Strollers lifting the trophy. A further two teams will be taking part in tournaments in November and December.

We asked the group to tell us a bit more about 1874 Northwich Women's Walking Football:

"We recently celebrated our first anniversary of women's walking football. We have sessions every Monday and Friday from 4pm to 5pm at Moss Farm, Northwich.

Walking football is a great way for those of a certain age (over 40) to enjoy taking part in a team game, meet new friends and boost physical and mental health.

Our group is made up of people of all abilities and varying experience whose main focus is enjoyment. We are a happy group who look out for each other and we would love to see more women join us. Our members regularly say how these sessions are the highlight of their week because of the friendship and camaraderie we share.

MANAGERIAL CHANGES PART THREE

Continuing our look at managerial changes in the Northern Premier League, today we look at changes which have occurred since the start of the season.

Just down the road, at the beginning of September Nantwich Town parted company with first team manager Dave Cooke by mutual consent. Cooke had been in charge of the Dabbers since May 2017 but a club statement said the decision was made with “the longer-term future of the club” in mind.

Assistant manager Ritchie Sutton was put in interim charge of the first team until being appointed as new manager on 21st September, sharing the position jointly with Gary Taylor-Fletcher. Sutton a former Nantwich player has also played for several Football League and non-league clubs while Taylor-Fletcher amassed over 500 career appearances and most notably featuring over 200 times for Blackpool, helping them secure promotion to the Premier League during the 2009/10 season. And of course played for the Vics as Gary Fletcher.

Staying in Cheshire but a bit further north, Widnes parted company with manager Dave Dempsey after little over a year in charge. During his time in charge, Dempsey has recorded 15 wins from 43 games as manager – a 35% win ratio. They were quick in appointing Michael Ellison as their new manager a week or so after he had left his previous post at City of Liverpool.

As Ellison moved out of the City of Liverpool hot seat it was filled by Paul McNally who had vacated the role at Skelmersdale United, which was filled by Richard Brodie. Brodie, 35, helped both Crawley Town and Fleetwood Town to promotion to the Football League during his playing career which included two seasons at Skelmersdale. Recently, he has been a first team coach with Ashton Athletic.

In mid September Matlock Town appointed former Boston United boss Craig Elliott as their new manager replacing Paul Phillips who left the club at the end of August by mutual consent.

Elliott, 44, has previously managed in the Northern Premier League with Shaw Lane and Ossett Town. Richard

Boryszczuk and John McDermott also joined the club as part of new boss Craig Elliott’s coaching setup; both having worked with Elliott previously at Boston United. Kayde Coppin, who acted as interim manager following the departure of Paul Phillips has left the club.

Phillips predecessor as Matlock Town manager Steve Kittrick has been appointed manager of Belper Town replacing Grant Black, who left the club by mutual consent. Kittrick, who brings over 25 years of managerial experience to the club, will be joined at the Raygar Stadium by Luke Potter, who played in the Football League with Barnsley and has enjoyed a number of managerial and coaching roles.

Lee Bullock has resigned from his position as joint manager of Whitby Town claiming a fresh voice and perspective was needed in the changing room going forwards.

Nathan Haslam who was Bullock’s co manager has taken over as sole manager assisted by former Hartlepool United manager Matthew Bates. Bullock is staying on at Whitby Town in his off-field role as Commercial Manager but will not be involved in any football or training matters. Tadcaster Albion parted company with manager John Deacey, appointed in October 2021, after a poor start to the season which has seen no wins from their first eight games.

The Brewers moved quickly to appoint a new management team of Craig Ogilvie, Neil Sibson & Andy Monkhouse. Ogilvie will oversee all first team management duties and will be assisted by Sibson. The pair were previously joint-managers of Yorkshire Amateur and were part of Liversedge’s coaching staff heading into the 2022/23 season, and will be joined at Ings Lane by Monkhouse, who will continue in his role as first team coach.

No doubt there will be more managerial changes to be reported as the season progresses.



HISTORIES AND PROFILES

THE '74

During the coming 12 months, the old adage that will be used most regularly by supporters of 1874 will be "doesn't time fly". The explanation for this is simple. You see, on 15 November this year, our smashing little club will celebrate its 10th anniversary!

Now, fans of clubs with longer and supposedly more illustrious past histories may scoff at our relatively brief existence and achievements. But despite being relative 'new kids on the block' it has been a decade packed with remarkable stories, amazing feats, successes, and some sadness – oh, and with the odd bit of football thrown in for good measure!

So, when it comes to summing up our history, it really is a case of where do we start and what do we include or leave out?

Some might say - and we would find it difficult to argue against this point - that the principal landmark occurred on that day in November 2012 when disillusioned members of the Northwich Victoria Supporters Trust voted overwhelmingly to create a new club. However, others might make the case for the evening of Wednesday 10 July 2013, for this was when '74 played their first ever game against local side Lostock Gram.

On that warm, balmy evening, just short of 400 fans turned out to see the first game of a club that they had decided to create, was something different, new and, most importantly, something that they had a direct say in. In short, a true fans' run club

Prior to that night a massive amount of hard work had been put in to ensure that the club could kick-off, as planned at the start of the 2013/14 season. This included

- Our successful application to join the North West Counties Football League
- The appointment of our first 'Gaffer', Ian Street
- The signing our first ground sharing agreement with Winsford United

The level of support shown for the new club wasn't a flash in the pan either as during our first season 1874's average home league attendance was 320 – which put the club in the top 100 best supported clubs in non-league football.

As it happened, '74 finished one place outside the two promotion spots, but due to the sudden and unfortunate demise of second-placed Formby, the club were asked whether we would like to accept the vacant spot in the Premier Division – an offer that was readily accepted!

So, season two presented '74 with the opportunity to create even more records – and did we take this chance with both hands! Along the way several new milestones were achieved, including our first ever appearance in the FA Cup and our highest league placing of third in the NWCFL Premier Division.

The 2015/16 season proved to be a steady campaign in the league with an eventual finishing spot of fourth, but it ended in a truly memorable manner when Ian Street's side outclassed local rivals and Step 3 outfit Witton Albion by a 3-0 score-line on their own turf to lift the Mid Cheshire District Cup for the first time. This trophy was retained the following campaign with a 1-0 win over rivals Northwich Vics, but by this time the management of the club had passed into the hands of Paul Bowyer and Wayne Goodison – both of whom had been part of Ian Street's back-room team.

The impact of the new management team was truly remarkable, as the 2017/18 season proved to be by far the most exciting and memorable in the short history of 1874, during which the 'Go-Bo' Green Army.

- Defeated National League North and former FA Trophy winners North Ferriby in the FA Cup
- Finally exited the competition on penalties in a Third Qualifying Round replay
- Reached the Semi-Finals of the FA Vase, only for eventual winners Thatcham Town to deny '74 a trip to Wembley by triumphing 4-2 on aggregate.
- Took hundreds of fans to away ties at Leighton

- and Thatcham
- Recorded a record home attendance of 1.674 in the second leg of the semi-final against the Wiltshire outfit
- Ended the season by playing a mammoth 26 games in just 57 days and 69 games overall

Given the successes of the '17/18 campaign, it would have been astonishing if '74 had been able to equal the achievements of the previous season. After all, even the top clubs in the country struggle to repeat their immediate past triumphs – so why should this not be true for '74?

So, a final position of tenth – the lowest that the club had finished in since being promoted to the Premier Division– did seem to suggest a decline in the clubs' fortunes. But that would be completely wrong, as 1874's final standing was hugely influenced by a difficult start to the season in which the loss of key players from the '17/18 campaign - allied to a cruel run of injuries to many of the clubs' key creative and attacking players - resulted in a somewhat disjointed first few months of the season and early exits in both the FA Cup and Vase.

Another factor that we probably didn't fully appreciate at the time was the impact that the untimely death in December 2017 of our inspirational and dearly loved Chairman Paul Stockton had on the club. It was therefore perhaps a fitting tribute to this wonderful man when, on the afternoon of Saturday 4 May 2019, his name was chanted aloud by the 500 or so '74 fans who had just witnessed their side lift its first major piece of silverware, an 88th minute goal by the Greens gave a deserved 1-0 victory over league champions City of Liverpool FC in the Final of the NWCFL League Cup.

This cup win proved to be a springboard for the club as from the very outset of the 2019/20 season it was clear that '74 would be one of the main contenders for the NWCFL title. Another good FA Cup run – which was halted at the Second Qualifying Round by an admittedly fortunate Whitby Town side – was

the precursor to an astonishing league campaign that included a 15-game unbeaten league run – another club record.

But it wasn't just the results that were impressive, it was the swash-buckling, stylish passing and pressing style of play in which '74 played the game that brought them so many plaudits and admiration from other clubs and commentators from all quarters. But in addition to their verve and panache, the side also possessed a steely, never-say-die, attitude that that gained them several precious points from seemingly difficult positions. This left '74 in the box seat at the head of the league with nine games left and 8 points ahead of second placed Rylands with a game in hand.

So, if there was ever a bunch of players and back-room staff that deserved to end a season celebrating a league title win, then it ought to have been our fabulous, wonderful team who represent our brilliant little club.

But alas, and for entirely understandable reasons, this was not to be. For as we all now know, the Covid 19 outbreak resulted in a sudden cessation to grassroots football and, heartbreakingly, the players, officials and fans alike were denied seeing the league trophy being paraded around Townfield.

Although we didn't know it at the time, '74's elevation to Step 4 was to be eventually delayed by 12 months as due to the re-organisation of the National League Pyramid, '74 became eligible for promotion to the newly created Northern Premier League West! And to celebrate this elevation, on 24 July 2021 the Greens became the first club in the 40+ year history of the competition to retain the NWCFL League Cup by convincingly defeating Runcorn Town 6-3 in the much delayed 2019/20 Final.

Life during our first campaign as a Step 4 club was inevitably challenging at times. As a small fish in a much bigger pool, almost each week we faced by clubs with far greater resources than we have at our disposal.

So, a final finishing spot of twelfth out of twenty was

highly satisfying end result. It might have been even more impressive had our home form had been a little more consistent!

But it's not all about what happens on the 6,000 square metres of turf that might set the club apart from many others. Being a democratically owned and operated community focussed club from the get-go, the partnerships we have forged with the local voluntary and business sectors are yet another example of how 1874 is demonstrating its commitment to be a 'community' club in terms of actions rather than words.

So, over the past decade not only have we forged beneficial partnerships with many well-respected local companies including Britannia Carpets and Oxy-Pro, but we've also forged excellent relationships with our chosen charity partners, which have included the Mid-Cheshire based Neuromuscular Centre, St Luke's Hospice, and the children's hospice 'The Joshua Tree'. In addition, regular collections have also taken place for local food banks, homeless people shelters, The Samaritans, Armed Services veterans, and a myriad of other deserving causes as well as attendance at community events.

The 2014/15 season also saw the club run an U21 side and since then, several of their number have now progressed to the First-team squad. More recently, 1874 have fielded sides at junior level and our plan is build on the establishment of this team as a stepping stone towards the creation of other sides covering all age groups, gender, and abilities.

Mention of all age groups and abilities reminds us that, along with the Cheshire FA, '74 have also played a major role in establishing local 'walking football' sessions each week which have proved to be hugely popular with the 'more mature' folks of Mid-Cheshire, most of whom might had thought that their playing days were well behind them!

2019 was also a landmark year off the field as, for the first time, 1874 finally played within the boundary of the town of Northwich having signed a 2-year agreement to share Barnton's Townfield Lane stadium.

A huge amount of work has been undertaken since this deal was signed to further improve the facilities for players, officials, and supporters alike and by doing so to enhance the match-day experience for all - as well as meeting the ground-grading requirements that were necessary for promotion to Step 4. The original agreement was extended last year and both clubs are

now working to develop a longer-term vision for the ground.

So, overall, 1874 is a club that is most definitely on the up!

But any progress that we may make will be achieved in a responsible and sustainable manner. Indeed, one of our main principles is that we will not jeopardise the long-term interests of the club by spending money just in order to ensure success on the pitch.

So, you could say that Inclusivity, Openness, Community and Sustainability is our USP.

But allied to this we also want to have success on and off the pitch and – as importantly - lots of fun!


And in our first decade, we think that we've achieved all of these aims beyond our wildest dreams!

PROFILES 22/23

The Management Team – Since April 2017 1874 have been guided by the managerial duo of Paul Bowyer and Wayne Goodison. Telford born Paul – who is a teacher by profession – joined '74 at its inception and played in the clubs' historic first game against Lostock Gralam. Paul's playing career was spent in the National game system and included spells with Congleton Town, Telford United and Alsager Town.

In comparison, Wayne spent the majority of his career in the Football League, firstly with Barnsley as an apprentice and then Crewe and Rochdale, chalking up a total of 209 league games. Since his playing days ended, he's held a number of management posts, including at Buxton, Trafford, Salford City and Chorley. In addition to obtaining a degree in Football Coaching & Management from UCFB, he followed this up by gaining a postgraduate Masters in Football Coaching & Practice.

Tony Aghayere – 'Big T' as he is affectionately known was well known to '74 fans before signing for the club in January 2019 as he'd previously been a key member of the Colne side that won the NWCFL title with Colne. His career has also included stops at Padiham, Mossley and Salford. Since joining '74 he's become a firm fans favourite, thanks to his consistent levels of performance during his 100+ games.



The Daniel Wilkinson Foundation is a charity set up in memory of Daniel Wilkinson who died in 2016 aged 24, while playing the game he loved, from an underlying heart condition called Arrhythmogenic Right Ventricular Cardiomyopathy (ARVC).



Dan played football from an early age and joined Hull City AFC when he was 10, earning a professional contract aged 18. Loughborough University followed where he completed a degree in Accounting and Financial Management while playing non-league football. He was an athlete who enjoyed the gym and took his health and nutrition very seriously. He lived life to the full and had so much ahead of him.

Other than feeling light-headed on a few occasions in the month before he died, he had no symptoms!

- SCD is the leading cause of death in young athletes during sport and the majority of deaths occur with NO SYMPTOMS or family history.
- ARVC can be found in one in every 1,000 to 5,000 young adults - IF IT IS LOOKED FOR.
- Warning signs may include light-headedness, fainting, palpitations, swollen legs, breathlessness.
- Every week in the UK, 12 apparently fit and healthy young people (aged 35 and under) die from previously undiagnosed heart conditions.
- In Italy, where screening is mandatory for all young people engaged in organised sport, they have reduced the incidence of young sudden cardiac death by 89%.

Ellis Allen – 20 year old Ellis was a trainee with Oldham Athletic and since leaving Boundary Park in the summer of 2020 has had spells between the sticks at Cypriot club APEA Akrotiri, Holywell Town as well as NWCFL outfit Whitchurch Alport.

Ollie Broe – A teammate of MacKenzie O'Neill at Wigan Athletic, Liverpool born Ollie is a versatile lad who can play on the right side of defence or midfield. Originally part of the Academy set up at Anfield, the 20 year old has also represented City of Liverpool, Litherland REMYCA, Farsley Celtic and Widnes.

Liam Buckley – A defender who plays right or left back and came through the youth ranks at Chester FC, 19 year old Liam spent last season with Welsh Premier Division outfit Cefn Druids.

Jamal Crawford – One of several summer recruits to the '74 cause, 24-year old Jamal started his career as a junior with Burnley. After a short stop playing in Wales for Llandudno, he returned to England and went onto appear for a number of clubs including FC United, Chester, Hyde United, Curzon Ashton, Bamber Bridge, Glossop, Trafford and most latterly Widnes.

Max Davidson – One of several new faces to have joined the '74 squad this summer, 19 year old Max hails from Northern Ireland. Normally found at left-back, he started off his career with the youth set up at Ballymena United before joining fellow Irish outfit Bangor. Subsequently he made the short hop over to Wales where he spent last season with Cefn Druids.

Markell Foulds – A strong and commanding figure at the heart of the '74 defence, this will be 21 year-old Markell's 2nd season with '74 having signed in the dotted line in August 2021. In addition to playing in the colours of Clitheroe and Barnoldswick, Markell has a wealth of youth football behind him including a scholarship with Salford City and for the UCFB Academy.

Matt Fenton – Matt's assurance and calmness on the ball certainly belies his tender years. Originally part of Crewe's youth system, it was as part of '74's highly regarded Under 21 side that he really began to shine. Pitched into the First XI towards the end of last season, 22 year old Matt acquitted himself

magnificently in his ten outings which included three bullet-headed goals.

Callum Gardner – Cal was snapped up from local rivals Winsford United in the summer of 2018 after having made a number of impressive performances for 'The Blues' against 'us. Now with 115 appearances and 19 goals to his credit, the 31 year old has also played for the full England FUTSAL side. He cites Mossley, FC United, Abbey Hey and Congleton as amongst his previous clubs.

Fenton Green – A central midfield player who was at Crewe Alexandra's academy, the 19 year old has already taken the eye of many '74 fans during the pre-season build up with his measured, calm performances. During the 21/22 campaign he had stints at Hyde United and Stockport Town.

Ryan Hough – A left full-back, Ryan was signed from NWCFL outfit Alsager Town in March 2022.

Jack Irlam – Having missed the truncated 2019/20 season with an ankle injury, 25 year old Jack came back well to feature in 29 league games for '74 in their debut season as a Step 4 club. Signed from Runcorn Town for whom he played over 100 Games, he's also been on the books of Ashton Town, Barnton and City of Liverpool.

Mark Jones – 1874's Mr Reliable, Mark is an unflappable, cultured player who has played a major role in our success over recent years since arriving in the summer of 2016. A versatile operator who can play equally well in midfield or the centre of defence, 36 year old Mark counts Witton, Nantwich and Radcliffe amongst his earlier ports of call. Is fast closing in on 150 appearances for '74.

Jeanny Le Blanc-Akpo – Snapped up this summer from Welsh League Champions TNS, this 20-year old Manchester based striker also counts Wigan Athletic, Altrincham and Bury FC among his former ports of call.

Henry Limpitishi Bongwanga – Currently studying for a Degree in Football Business and Finance at the University Campus of Football Business (UCFB), Henry was once on the books of Coventry City and

Cheltenham Town. A natural striker who has also appeared for the 'Towns' of Kettering, Cheadle and Stockport, Henry was selected to play for the British Universities squad last year along with former '74 player Ben Woods.

Jack Marrow – After completing his scholarship with Crewe Alexandra, 19 Year old Jack joined '74 in the summer of 2021 but made just 2 appearances before injury put paid to his season with the club. A loan spell at Alsager aided him in his recovery and he's now back at Townfield keen to make up for lost time.

Issac Noble – An exciting and pacy left winger of whom much is expected, 20-year old Isaac is one of many young lads who have made the step up from the U21 side to the first team.

Mackenzie O'Neill - A former member of the Wigan Athletic academy and a Northern Ireland U17 international, 20 year old Mackenzie signed for the club shortly after impressing when scoring for Prescot Cables against 1874 in October 2021.

Manuel Diop Parra – One of a number of summer additions to the '74 squad, 26 year old Manuel can play in a number of positions across the back. Originally from Spain, he counts Kendal Town, Longridge Town and Manchester League side Old Altrinchamians amongst his former clubs.

Josh Quarless – A graduate of the Liverpool Sunday football scene, 6'7" tall Josh will certainly add a different dimension to the '74 front line. Described by a previous manager as being "big, strong, good in the air with great feet and an eye for goal", he made the short trip from Runcorn Linnets in August having scored 22 goals for Burscough and City of Liverpool last season.

Harry Walker – Capable of playing in midfield or defence Harry joined the club in the summer of 2021.

Joe Woolley – The younger brother of the club captain, Joe is actually one of three Woolley brothers who have played for 74, the other being Jack. Snapped up from Market Drayton in 2015, his early career with '74 was blighted by injury, a fact underlined by the fact that he made less than 50 outings in his first 6 years with the club. Happily he's now back firing on all

cylinders, as his 6 goals in 38 appearances for '74 last season testifies.

Matt Woolley – The club captain, Matty is also '74's longest serving player having made his debut as a substitute in the 2014 Christmas-time tussle with Widnes. A Northwich lad, he was signed from Cheshire League side Knutsford FC. Matt has had spells at Congleton Town and Alsager, Witton Albion and FC Halifax Town and he's now chalked up 327 games for the club netting 40 goals.

Ash Woods - Ash joined the club in October 2020 having had a wealth of experience with the likes of Atherton Collieries, Trafford, Colwyn Bay, Northwich Vics and West Didsbury and Chorlton. A real goal-poacher, Ash will no doubt be looking to increase the potency of the '74 attack in what will be his first full season with '74.

Ben Woods - A returning face, Ben Woods is a left sided defender with a mean set piece who has re-joined the club from NPL Premier side Stalybridge Celtic.



HISTORIES AND PROFILES

TODAY'S VISITORS: GLOSSOP NORTH END

EARLY YEARS

Glossop North End were founded in 1886, when they played friendly amateur matches. They played at various grounds in the town, including Pyegrove, Silk Street, Water Lane and Cemetery Road before settling at North Road. The club joined the North Cheshire League in 1890, before moving to the Combination in 1894 and turning professional. In their first season in the Combination, 1894–95, they finished as runners-up. After ending the following season, 1895–96, in third, the club moved to the Midland League and in the 1896–97 season finished as runners-up.

After a second season in the Midland League, they were elected to the Second Division of the Football League in 1898–99 finishing as runners-up to Manchester City and winning promotion to the First Division. They then changed their name to Glossop (primarily to avoid any confusion with Preston North End) before spending their one and only season in the top flight, 1899–1900 when they finished in last place and were relegated back to the Second Division, having won only 4 matches, all at home, against Burnley, Nottingham Forest, Blackburn and Aston Villa.

They then spent the next fifteen seasons in the Second Division, during which time they reached the Quarter-Finals of the FA Cup in 1908–09 where they lost to 1–0 to eventual finalists Bristol City in a replay on 10 March 1909. The club's chairman and benefactor at the time was Sir Samuel Hill-Wood, who was later to become chairman of Arsenal. However, the club became perennial strugglers in the Second Division.

The 1913–14 season saw a club record attendance of 10,736 for an FA Cup Second Round match against Preston North End on 31 January 1914. However, the following season they finished bottom of the league and had to apply for re-election. This was curtailed when the start of World War I meant the Football League closed down. Glossop were then re-formed toward the end of the war by Oswald Partington, but failed to be re-elected back into the Football League. Glossop then joined the Lancashire Combination, playing just one season, 1919–20.

Northern Nomads ground-shared with Glossop for several years during this time. The club then dropped out of the Lancashire Combination and into the Manchester League. In the 1920s and 1930s they won the Gilcryst Cup three times and were crowned Manchester League champions in 1927–28. They won the Gilcryst Cup for a fourth time in 1947–48.

1950'S ONWARDS

During 1955, the club moved from its original home of North Road to their current ground Surrey Street. In 1957 Glossop re-joined the Lancashire Combination, finishing in eighth in 1957–58. They spent nine seasons in the league before dropping back down once more to the Manchester League after the 1965–66 season.

They joined the Cheshire County League as founder members of Division Two in the 1978–79 season, finishing in 17th. In 1980–81 they were Division Two runners-up, only losing out on the title on goal difference, but still winning promotion to Division One. After a sixth-place finish in 1981–82, the club became founder members of the newly formed North West Counties Football League in 1982 when the Cheshire County League merged with the Lancashire Combination. In 1986, the club marked their centenary season with a match with sister club Arsenal. They joined Division One, however they struggled in the league for the next six seasons and after finishing bottom in 1987–88 were relegated to Division Two. The 1990–91 season saw the club reach the Fourth Round of the FA Vase where they lost to Cammell Laird 2–1 in a replay. They also won the North West Counties Football League Division Two Cup, beating Cheadle Town 2–1 in the Final.

However, the club almost folded in 1990–91 when their then Chairman sold the ground to the local council and left the club with large debts. The present Board of Directors took over in January 1991. After a sixth-place finish in 1991–92 they were promoted back to Division One over higher placed clubs and after the season the directors reverted the club's name to Glossop North End.



In their first season under the club's original name, they reached the Semi-Finals of the North West Counties League Cup, before losing to Nantwich Town 5–2 over two legs. They reached the Semi-Finals of the League's floodlit Cup in 1994–95, losing to Penrith 3–1 over two legs. In the 1996–97 season they beat Trafford in the Final of the Manchester Premier Cup at Old Trafford, before winning the competition again the following season, this time beating Radcliffe Borough in the final at Maine Road. They also reached the Semi-Finals of the North West Counties League Cup, losing to Vauxhall Motors 3–1 over two legs.

2000S ONWARDS

In the 2000–01 season they won the Derbyshire County Football Association Senior Challenge Cup beating Glapwell in a two-legged final, drawing 3–3 away and 2–2 at home before winning 4–2 on penalties. In the league the club struggled to avoid relegation from Division One throughout much of the early 2000s, before finishing ninth in 2006–07, the highest position attained by manager Chris Nicholson in his six seasons at the club. Nicholson announced in March 2007 that he was to step down at the end of the season. As a result, his assistant Steve Young was eventually appointed manager for 2007–08. In the 2008–09 season they reached the Final of the FA Vase where they lost 2–0 to Northern League First Division side Whitley Bay at Wembley Stadium, on 10 May 2009.

Due to this achievement, Arsenal, with whom they retain connections due to Arsenal chairman Peter Hill-Wood's grandfather Sir Samuel Hill-Wood having owned and bankrolled Glossop during their run in the Football League, invited them to their state-of-the-art London Colney training ground during their stay in London, to prepare for the FA Vase Final.

In May 2013 the club appointed Chris Wilcock as first team manager. In his first season the team finished third in the North West Counties League. During the season Glossop produced an unbeaten run in the league of 22 games, with only 5 draws, stretching from November 2013 until they were beaten by Bootle on April 2014.

On 19 April 2015 Glossop beat Nelson to win the North West Counties League Premier Division, earning promotion to Division One North of the Northern Premier League. They also reached two cup finals; the North West Counties League Cup, where they faced Atherton Collieries winning 2–0, and the FA Vase Final, in which they played North Shields at Wembley Stadium. In a repeat of the 2009 final, Glossop were beaten 2–1 after extra-time.

Glossop began the 2015–16 season in the Northern Premier League Division One North. They also competed in the FA Trophy for the first time since 1986. The club finished fourth and qualified for the Play-offs but lost 2–1 to Northwich Victoria in the Semi-Final.

At the end of the 2016-17 season Chris Wilcock resigned as manager, leaving the position after four seasons and as the winningest manager in recorded history. On 19 May 2017 the club announced that the joint team of Steve Halford and Paul Phillips would take the reins at Surrey Street. On 12 March 2018 the management team left Glossop to join Buxton. Goalkeeper coach Mark Canning took over as caretaker manager, assisted by Andy Bishop. This was made a permanent position at the end of the 2017-18 season.

After a poor run of results, culminating in a loss to Widnes in mid-October, Mark and Andy were sacked as managers. After a short search the board appointed ex-Mossley duo Peter Band and Lloyd Morrison as joint managers on 14 October 2018.

In an unprecedented move the majority of football activities were ceased mid-March 2020 due to the coronavirus, and by the end of March the NPL took the decision along with all Step 4 and lower divisions to end the season early and expunge all results with no promotion or relegation taking place. This left Glossop situated in the South /East Division for a second season due to the Step 4 re-alignment not occurring. At the beginning of August Joint Manager Lloyd Morrison departed the club to become Cheadle Town's manager.

The coronavirus took centre stage again in the '20/21 season, with only a handful of games being played before the season was cancelled in February 2021. This was followed in March 2021 by the resignation of manager Pete Band who left to join up with his hometown team Macclesfield FC. The new manager, Stuart Mellish, took charge at the beginning of May ready to start the 2021/22 season in the newly realigned Northern Premier League West Division. Glossop finished seventeenth avoiding the relegation spots.
